### SIAMS Visit

Friday 20<sup>th</sup> November – the last Friday before half term, we received an inspection from the Church of England. This is called a SIAMS visit. (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools)

During the inspection, we were asked to submit information about various elements of school life and present our self-evaluation document. This discussed themes such as our vision and values; our quality of education; our community links; our work with all pupils; our governance; our community work; our links with the church; our collective worship; our R.E curriculum and many more themes.

It was a thorough inspection from an experienced inspector who had previously been a head teacher and an OFSTED inspector. During the inspection she met with pupils, parents, governors, Rev. Rich, staff and our Diocesan link worker.

While we have some areas to develop, we met the criteria for a successful inspection. In this we take great pride. Next week, I will upload the full report onto the school website. For now, here are some of the key strengths we are proud of:

- Our vision is lived out with integrity and has a huge impact upon pupils' lives that allows them to flourish.
- Our remodelled curriculum is utilising the environment and supports the vision.
- Our curriculum encourages curiosity and understanding and instils our ethos of 'dreaming big and aiming high'.
- Relationships in school are exceptionally strong.
- Pupils are kind and care for one another.
- Pupils recognise the need for compassion.
- Highly effective partnership work is a feature of the school.
- Collective Worship is a strength of the school.
- Learning has been made purposeful, vibrant and enjoyable.

There are many more comments I could pick out. I am proud of where we are at and encouraged by what is external validation of our vision and leadership model.

I do not doubt there is work to do. Both myself and the staff remain wholeheartedly committed to the same vision I share with the children of being "the best school in the Universe."

My hope coming out of this external view of our school is that you stop, take the time to read it and feel encouraged by the positive feeling we are creating. Small things should not wobble the foundations of our school. We can talk, and move forward; we have proven this already. St Mary's CE Clymping is doing lots of things very well. This is not down to any one individual. It involves all of us.
